Once voted the second-hippest district in the world by Vogue magazine, Queen West is ever-changing and reinventing itself, but it remains stalwartly Bohemian, eclectic and intriguing. Wandering along Queen is like touring an ideal neighbourhood where art, culture and commerce co-exist in a fantastically compelling mix of charm and creativity.

Queen West is, at the same time, a trendy shopping strip, part of the Entertainment District, and a funky treasure hunt. Art galleries vie for attention with shops selling only buttons or beads.



Queen West Flashback

Queen West is a chameleon, constantly changing with the times, and its ability to adapt is the key to its appeal. Dynamic and daring, Queen West remains true to itself. Its roots in the 19th century are stunningly displayed by all its preserved Victorian red brick commercial buildings. Originally designed for business owners to live above their stores, these buildings still combine retail at ground level and residences above.

THE REIGNING QUEEN OF COOL

Before Queen West became the hotbed of fashion and design it is now, it was for many years a vital part of the Garment District, supplying textiles and accessories for nearby factories turning out apparel for the nation. Walk west on Queen from Spadina and you'll see remnants of those times in a few remaining fabric stores.

Farther west, some historical landmark buildings have been completely renovated and revitalized, and are totally worth a visit: the Drake Hotel, with its sky bar and restaurants; the Gladstone Hotel, where every room was designed by a different artist; and the Great Hall, a performance venue since 1889. And don't miss the Horseshoe Tavern, which was ground zero for the '70s punk scene; the Rivoli, where '80s acts got their start; and the Black Bull with its great people-watching on a big patio overlooking Queen West.

HISTORIC

Kensington hasn't always been a marketplace. In the late 1880s it was designed as a residential neighbourhood, and many of its tall, narrow, brick Victorian homes remain; painted in bold primary colours, they are a big factor in the market's distinct look. In the 1930s, with the influx of many Jewish immigrants looking for business opportunities, "The Jewish Market" was born. Ground floors of houses were converted into stores, and the market became a thriving business district. Then, starting in the 1950s, immigrants from Portugal's Azores islands, Brazil, the Caribbean and southeast Asia added to the fascinating diversity of Kensington Market.

Once a month the market is closed off to cars, and the streets come alive with buskers, performance artists, live art making, and dancers. Spend the whole day there and find a different way to be entertained every half block.













TRINITY BELLWOODS PARK

Designed on landfill over Garrison Creek, this massive park is welcome green space for the 'hood. Dogs can run free in the dip between steep grassy slopes, and up above near Dundas St. an organic Farmer's Market takes place Tuesdays from May to October. In winter there's a hockey rink, and in summer, tennis courts. Grab some gourmet takeout food, and lounge under the trees on a blanket on the grass with your friends.




Running for one kilometre. parallel with the south side of Queen Street, Graffiti Alley is an explosive mashup of graffiti art by some of the world's best, including local artists. You may be familiar with the alley from "22 Minutes" when Rick Mercer paced up and down it, ranting about current events. 




